Supes eye Super Dollar

The Kemper County board of supervisors are considering purchasing the old Super Dollar building located across the street from the courthouse in DeKalb.

Board president Pat Granger said no final decision has been made but added that the price was good. Supervisors passed a resolution concerning the pending purchase during their Monday meet-

ing. In other matters, supervisors voted to:

- Approve the claims docket and the county payroll;
- Approve an order allowing circuit clerk Shirley Jackson to open an interest bearing account at Commercial Bank totaling \$334,593 and using a county tax ID number. This money is being held as part of an upcoming civil suit;
- Approve the purchase of two

Dodge Durango vehicles for the sheriff's department at the cost of \$65,740 using CARES Act money;

- Approve an order approving invoices totaling \$13,188 for project ERBR•BR•0035;
- Approve an order paying \$135,352 to T.L. Wallace Construction Co. for project ERBR•BR•0035;
- Approve an order adding work on the McFarland Road and the Ross Road to the county's

four-year road plan;

- Approve an order purchasing five county pickup trucks classified as specialty use; and,
- Approve a certificate of the IRS personnel roll for Kemper County for 2020.

Supervisors tabled an order to accept bids for the roof repair at Kemper Springs Community Center, and for bids for the rest rooms.

EMEPA CLOSE TO RESTORING ALL CUSTOMERS

The East Mississippi Electric Power Association expected to have electricity restored to most of its Kemper County customers by Wednesday.

"We are getting close," said EMEPA spokes-

woman Julie Boles. "If you include last Monday's and Wednesday's storms, we had around 32,000 customers out. We hope by this Wednesday to have everyone will be back on."

Nearly 90 percent of Kemper County was without power since last Wednesday when the second of two major winter storms hit the area.

"We had gotten the number of power out-

ages in Kemper County down to single digits from the first storm," Boles said. "Then the second storm hit. Kemper and Winston counties took the brunt of that storm."

Along with EMEPA trucks, crews from Prentiss County and the North Central Electric

Mask ordinance extended through April 15

The Kemper County board of supervisors has extended its county-wide mask mandate through April 15.

The mandate was first passed last year in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. It has been extended each month by the board. This action came during the supervisors' Monday meeting.

It requires that masks be worn in public. Anyone who violates the ordinance, upon conviction, could face a \$500 fine and/or six months in jail.

The number of cases of

COVID-19 in Kemper County has increased by 10 this past week, according to statistics provided by the Mississippi Department of Health website.

Kemper County has 891 reported cases as of Monday, an increase of 10 in the past week. The county has 22 reported deaths.

Mississippians are strongly encouraged to wear a mask, social distance, avoid large gatherings, and wash hands frequently. Vaccination is also encouraged for those who are eligible. Current eligibility includes Mississippi residents or those who work in Mississippi ages 65 and older, or those 16-64 with certain underlying conditions,

healthcare personnel, and residents of long term care facilities.

The rate of the number of new cases has gone down across the state in recent weeks. According to health department numbers, there were 2,905 new cases in Mississippi in the past week.

There have been 290,874 cases reported in Mississippi since March 2020, and 6,553 reported deaths, an increase of 89 since last week.

The Mississippi State Department of Health (MSDH) advises Mississippians to please be patient in the coming days if there is a longer than usual wait time at our drive-through vaccination

sites.

Because of severe winter weather last week, MSDH has had to schedule more appointments than usual for this week (as make-up dates), in order to reduce delays in getting as many Mississippians vaccinated as possible.

Please arrive for your vaccination appointment 15 minutes early, and please keep to your assigned appointment time.

Additionally, the MSDH Central Office in Jackson was closed on Tuesday due to lack of water. The MSDH Public Health Laboratory will remain OPEN for all services, including water testing and clinical testing.

Tax incentives for soil and water conservation

For many of Mississippi's farmers, good stewardship of the land is especially important.

By applying sound conservation practices, farmers help control and prevent erosion and increase soil fertility which corresponds to better wildlife habitat, cleaner rivers and streams, and more productive farmland. To assist with the cost of practices aimed at improving soil and water quality on agricultural lands, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) allows for the deduction of certain expenses for soil and water conservation

or for the prevention of erosion on lands used for farming.

However, the IRS does not allow for the deduction of ordinary and necessary expenses such as interest and taxes, cost of periodically clearing brush from productive land, annual removal of sediment from drainage ditches, and any other expenses paid or incurred to produce an agricultural crop.

According to the IRS, a person is considered a farmer if that person cultivates, operates, or manages a farm for profit, either as owner or tenant. A person is not considered to be farming if he or she farms for recreation or pleasure and not

for profit. Also, forestry and/or the growing of trees are not considered farming by the IRS.

A farm is defined by the IRS as including stock, dairy, poultry, fish, fruit, and truck farms. Plantations, ranches, ranges, and orchards are also included. A plant nursery is a farm for the purposes of deducting soil and water conservation expenses.

The IRS allows for the deduction of soil and water conservation practices only if they are consistent with a plan approved by the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS). If the farmer does not have a plan from the

NRCS, then a plan from a comparable state agency can be used. Individual site plans and county plans can be obtained by contacting your local NRCS office.

Expenses that are incurred by a farmer for soil and water conservation are deductible only for lands owned by the farmer or the tenant that is using the land for farming. The expenses that qualify for deduction include treatment or movement of earth (leveling, conditioning, grading, terracing, contour furrowing, and restoration of soil fertility) and construction, control, and protection of diversion channels, drainage

ditches, irrigation ditches, earthen dams, and watercourses, outlets, and ponds.

A person cannot deduct expenses for soil and water conservation for draining or filling in a wetland or to prepare land for center pivot irrigation systems.

In some cases, landowners are levied an assessment for soil and water conservation practices conducted by the area soil and water or drainage district. These expenses are also deductible as a conservation expense if they cover expenses you could deduct if you had paid them directly or covers expenses for depreciable prop-

erty used in the district's business.

Types of depreciable property include pumps, locks, concrete structures (including dams and weir gates), draglines, and similar equipment.

Certification Now Available In response to limited face-to-face training caused by COVID-19, the Mississippi Department of Agriculture-Bureau of Plant Industry has approved an online private applicator certification program developed by the MSU Extension Service. Persons needing to obtain or renew their private applicator certification can complete the online training (two video training modules and a competency exam) by visiting the Online Private Applicator Certification Program on the Mississippi State University Extension's website at extension.msstate.edu. The fee for training and testing is \$20, payable online by credit card, debit card, or eCheck. Successful completion of the training will certify the private applicator to purchase and use restricted use pesticides (RUPs) in the State of Mississippi for a period of 5 years. Ways to keep your low carbs with cold weather food

With all this cold weather, we are looking for some good "stick to your ribs" recipes. You may fear you will have to give up low carbs for comfort, but never fear. There are options available. Just remem-

ber that healthy eating requires planning and moderation.

LOW-CARB LASAGNA
2 cabbages (medium)
2 pounds lean ground beef
1 Anaheim pepper (chopped)
1 white onion (or yellow, finely chopped)
1 clove garlic (minced)

1 teaspoon oregano
2 teaspoons basil
28 ounces crushed tomatoes (with Italian herbs)
1 egg white
1 cup gouda cheese (shredded)
1 cup mozzarella cheese (shredded)
1 cup Parmesan cheese (shredded)

salt
pepper
red pepper flakes

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Cut cabbage heads in half and boil for 15-20 minutes until soft. Drain water and chop into 1" squares. Then sauté cabbage for 2-3 minutes to remove excess water. Let cool and wrap

cabbage leaves in dishtowel, squeezing out remaining water. Brown beef in skillet. When most of the pink is gone, add pepper and onion. Sauté 3 more minutes until thoroughly cooked and onion has softened. Add garlic, oregano and basil and cook 1 more minute. Remove from heat. In a medium bowl, whisk

egg white into crushed tomatoes. Add to meat mixture and season with salt and pepper. In a separate bowl, mix cheeses together. To assemble, double layer cabbage, meat sauce and cheese in greased 9" x 13" pan. Sprinkle with red pepper flakes if desired. Bake 20 minutes or if desired. **See COOK, page 4**

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GETTING THE MESSAGE/Rev. Chris Shelton

Acts 4:1-22

We see the apostles Peter and John on trial in this passage. They are arrested after Peter (through the power of Jesus name) heals a crippled man. The arrest is not triggered as much from the healing as it is what Peter is saying. He is teaching a large Jewish crowd that Jesus of Nazareth, whom they crucified, is the promised Christ and has been raised from the dead (verses 1-3).

When the trial begins the next day, the Jewish leaders ask Peter and John by what power or what name did you do this (verse 7)? Then we are told that Peter is filled with the Holy Spirit and he answers directly. And in his answer we see what the chief work of the Holy Spirit is: to exalt Christ.

Peter says let it be known to you and all Israel that this has happened "by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified, whom God raised from the dead." Peter goes on to quote Psalm 118; that Jesus is the cornerstone of the people of God, and that "there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved."

In other words if you do not have Christ, you will perish outside of the people of God, you will not have a place. There are three main defects in men since the fall. There is ignorance and blindness to God; there is rebellion in the will and affections toward God; we are in a cursed position subject to God's wrath because of this.

We need a Savior answerable to these needs, and Christ, the Son of God, is the only sufficient Savior. There is no other way to be reconciled to God. Christ died for sinners, and he was raised from the dead that men may be justified before God.

The Holy Spirit opens our eyes to the light of Christ. He convinces us of our sin and misery, the holiness of God, and the need of Christ's sacrifice. You can do nothing apart from God's Spirit. We have no power over the devil and death. We cannot take our own sins or any other person's sins away. Truly, we will not believe the truth of God apart from the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit being poured out at Pentecost is a testament to our spiritual poverty and God's grace. He points poor sinners to a loving

Savior who gave himself for them. He brings refreshment to the soul, makes Christ the name above all names in our hearts. The Holy Spirit is the gift of life. Life is more than material. Life that endures is in knowing Christ.

We see the Spirit give the apostles boldness (verse 12). Jesus had told his disciples the night before he was to be crucified that they would be persecuted by men; that the servants were not above the Master. If men hated Christ, they would hate his disciples also. But Jesus had also told them he would never leave them; that the Holy Spirit would be with them in tribulation and on trial before men.

The contrast between the apostles and the Jewish leaders stands out at the end of the trial. The rulers are worried about the opinions of the people (verses 16-17); the apostles are focused on being obedient to God. The rulers threaten the apostles. Peter and John answer: "Whether it is right in the sight of God to listen to you rather than to God, you must judge, for we cannot but speak of what we have seen and heard (verse 19)."

They are very respectful, and are making an appeal for their Jewish brothers to pay careful attention to what has happened. This is the hand of God. Christ has been raised from the dead. It is not the time to fear losing your position, or losing face, or pursuing worldly ambitions. They are in great jeopardy from God; now is the time to repent, rather than resist.

The gospel of Christ is opportunity. And when it goes forth, there will be souls who believe. We see in verse 4, that 5000 souls believed from Peter's sermon. Even among these obstinate rulers and priests gathered to threaten the apostles, some would come to faith (Chapter 6:7).

Men can threaten and put to death Christ's people in this world. But they are powerless to thwart God's purposes he has for his gospel. Christ will be proclaimed. Some will come to him. Others will perish outside of him. So the Lord appeals to us all, seek Christ (and the life in him), while he may be found. Look into these things, and call on the name of the Lord.

LOW CARB CHICKEN CASSEROLE

16 ounces cauliflower (bag of, thawed)
3 tablespoons margarine (stick)
1 1/2 pounds boneless skinless chicken breast (cut into bite

size pieces)
1 tablespoon seasoning (chicken)
2 1/2 teaspoons margarine (stick)
2 1/2 teaspoons flour (all-purpose)
2 cups cheddar cheese (shredded sharp, divided)
1 1/4 cups milk (can use regular milk)
1/2 teaspoon pepper (or to taste)
1/4 teaspoon salt

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a skillet, large enough to hold the chicken, melt margarine over medium heat. Add chicken and sprinkle with chicken seasoning; stirring well to coat. Cook until no longer pink and slightly browned. Set aside.

To make the Cheese Sauce: In a medium-sized saucepan, melt margarine over medium/low heat. Add flour and cook until

lightly browned. Stir in milk, a little at a time, until slightly thickened.

Stir 1 1/2 cups cheese into milk. To get the desired thickness or thinness, you might want to add a bit more milk. Add salt and pepper to taste. In a large bowl, add cauliflower, chicken, and cheese sauce. Then pour into a greased 2-quart pan. Sprinkle with remaining cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes.

LOW CARB CHILI

1 1/4 pounds ground beef
8 ounces tomato paste
1 1/2 tomatoes (chopped)
1 red bell pepper (chopped)
1/2 cup onion (chopped)
2 celery sticks (chopped)
1 1/2 teaspoons cumin
1 1/2 teaspoons chili powder
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
3/4 cup water

Brown meat in fry pan. Once almost finished, drain off fat and sprinkle 1/2 teaspoon salt over meat. Add onions and peppers to pan and continue to cook for 1-2 minutes. Combine cooked meat, onions, peppers, tomatoes, celery, water, and tomato paste in large pot. Stir spices into pot. Bring to boil, then reduce heat to low-medium and let simmer for 1-2 hours, stirring every 30 minutes or so.
